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### ABSTRACT

In the earliest times did Ymir live: was nor sea nor land nor salty waves neither earth was there nor upper heaven, but a gaping nothing, and green things nowhere.

The relationship between Roberto Bonati and Norway began in 2012, when he conducted the Royal Academy di Oslo Ensemble in his Snow Flowers (a project on Japanese Haiku Poetry). This new work - *nor sea, nor land, nor salty waves* – was specifically commissioned by Bjergsted Jazz Ensemble of Stavanger to Roberto Bonati and had its debut on 21st march 2015 at Stavanger Jazz Forum. The Italian composer caught the chance to make his research among the Normans' legends, the mythological saga of Nordic heroes, the ancient poems of Ljóða Edda (*Völuspá -Prophecy of the Völva*). The result is a evocative homage to Norway, full of original lyricism.

All the myths are stories concerning earlier times and the creation of a world where humanity, not different from today, is struggling to find peace on Earth. This is how this musical journey, my personal homage to the Scandinavian traditions, began.
